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LETTERS FROM LARRY **Tackling Neurodivergent Employment Challenges**

Did you know the unemployment rate for neurodivergent adults is estimated to be 30-40%? Of that group, adults with autism have an unemployment rate of nearly 85-90%. Once able to secure a job, neurodivergent individuals can face many challenges in the workplace, including bias and prejudice, sensory overload, and issues with managing workload.

In 2023, after identifying that finding and keeping a job was difficult for many of our students and adult alumni, I began collaborating with industry contacts and organizations develop the Neurodiversity to Employment Partnership (NEP). Our purpose is to bring awareness to neurodivergent employment issues, offer stories and examples of successful outcomes, and connect employers and employees with one another. Our first NEP Workshop was held in April 2024 and included an array of speakers, resources, and attendees. A second workshop is

being planned for April 2025 during Autism Empowerment Month.

Neurodiversity in employment is a smart business decision, and we are always looking for more employers willing to explore having an inclusive workforce. For job providers, the positive impacts on organizational culture are vast, including a more effective and productive workforce with increased loyalty and retention. For job seekers, increased selfconfidence and independence are gained from meaningful work that contributes to the community.

In the coming months, I'll share more information about this important partnership, its member network. and the vital resources NEP intends to share throughout New England to increase employment opportunities for neurodivergent adults and foster inclusivity in the workplace. Stay tuned.

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Standards for Accreditation

STAFF SPOTLIGHT - NCASES TEAM Preparing for the NCASES Accreditation Process

In the fall of 2023, the League School embarked on an ambitious journey to pursue an accreditation that goes bevond the essential licenses required by the Department of Elementary & Secondary Education (DESE) and the Department of Early Education and Care (DEEC). This decision initiated a thorough process of internal discovery and reflection concerning both our school and residential programs. This optional accreditation process from the National Commission for the Accreditation of Special Education Services (NCASES) was uniquely developed to address private special education programs.

For the past nine months, over 20 dedicated members of our League School community have engaged in a collaborative effort to produce a comprehensive self-study of our program. This initiative was led by our leadership team, which aimed to meticulously evaluate every aspect of our offerings. The accreditation process was structured around 50 rigorous standards, each designed to assess our practices, processes, and policies, all of which required concrete evidence of compliance. We carefully documented our adherence to these standards, demonstrating our commitment to aligning with established policies through a detailed review of our practices. The culmination of this extensive process is a three-day onsite evaluation conducted by four external surveyors from around the country, all of whom are seasoned experts in the field of special education. During their visit, we have the opportunity to showcase our incredible students, dedicated

and passionate staff, and our welcoming facility.

This accreditation initiative has given us a valuable opportunity to reflect deeply on and critically assess our service delivery in several key areas, including educational and residential service delivery, financial management, vocational programming, communication, and curriculum development. Throughout this reflective process, we identified specific areas for improvement and have taken proactive measures to align our practices more closely with the best available practices in the field. By evaluating and refining our service delivery, we are committed to continuously enhancing the quality and effectiveness of the support we provide to our students and their families. For this, we owe immense gratitude to Stephanie Steen, League School's Director of Clinical & Quality Assurance, and the entire NCASES Team! Thank you for your dedicated efforts.

Sanjay also works at Winslow Farm Animal Sanctuary, one of his favorite community work sites.
